MISSIONARIES IN NEED



What a thrill it was for all of those attending **First FWB Church of Florence** on March 25 & 26th. These days marked the 3rd Annual Big Day for the church. It began on Saturday with 260 young people (that's not counting those who came back on Sunday) who attended a special service that was followed by a free meal and fun time. The weekend was capped off on Sunday with a record drive-in crowd of 582!!! That makes a total of 842 people who attended these services! Extra chairs had to be put out to seat everyone.

The church fed everyone BBQ and chicken bog and all the trimmings afterwards. Counting Saturday and Sunday, there were over 200 first time visitors. Best of all was when people began to move during the invitation. When all was said and done, 4 people had given their hearts to Christ and 2 came to rededicate their lives back to God. They presented a great musical drama (54 Church members were involved in the drama!) depicting the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus to a packed house on Saturday night, April 8th. Then they presented the same drama again on Easter Sunday morning with 207 in attendance and 3 precious souls saved.

Pastor Rickey Evans reports that they had 159 in attendance on Easter Sunday at Evergreen FWB Church of Conway and 149 of them came back the next Sunday! The Church is showing constant growth due in a large part to the fact that Brother Rickey is constantly pushing visitation. Learning the Ropes: Confessions of a Young Preacher

One thing was certain on July 27, 2003: I was supposed to be at Free Will Baptist Bible College. Without knowing exactly what to major in, I packed my bags and made the 500-mile journey to a place that has become a second home to me. Within my first semester, I felt the Lord's gentle tugging on my heart to preach and I readily accepted that call. Almost immediately, I began receiving opportunities to preach (a few more times than I was ready for).

In these past two-plus years I have probably learned more of what not to do from the pulpit than what to do. But after preaching about 50 times, taking courses on preaching, and being exposed to a lot of great preaching, there are a four facts I can say are true of preaching.



- 1) It is by the Holy Spirit that men are convicted. Believe it or not, it is not about us. That may come as a bit of a surprise. After all, some preachers are so gifted that they can wax eloquently about any topic and people will listen. However, will they hear the man or the message? Apart from the power of God and the work of the Holy Spirit, we as preachers and witnesses for Christ cannot bring about the heartfelt conviction needed to change lives but Christ can! John 12:32 is the instruction we need: "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me." With all the discussion and empty rhetoric today about materials and methods, our preaching must be founded in this verse. Lift up Christ and lives will be changed.
- 2) It is by my preparation that God sees me as faithful. What a terrible a feeling it is to enter the pulpit unprepared! It is dishonoring to God, a disappointment to a congregation, and a discouragement to the preacher himself. Though the apostle Paul does not include in any of his epistles the number of hours a preacher should spend toiling over an outline or manuscript, he does instruct a young preacher named Timothy to study to show himself approved unto God. Whether that ends up being 5, 10, or 20 hours put into one message, the Holy Spirit will convict me if I am unprepared, and encourage me if I am prepared.
- 3) It is by Christ's finished work that I have something to preach. Everyone has an opinion. It would be all too easy to mount the pulpit, read passage of scripture, and then jump on a hobby-horse and preach my opinions and personal convictions. However, the Spirit of God compels me to preach of a Christ who died for all. If my willingness or desire to communicate this truth abates, then I fail to do what I am called to do.

Paul confessed to his readers in 1 Corinthians that he did not preach with words of wisdom, but he preached the cross of Christ which has the power to save men. It is a sobering thought to realize that your vocabulary, oratorical ability, and spiritual platitudes pale in comparison with a man who prepares and disciplines himself to preach solely about the suffering servant who is Jesus. Preach Christ and this will honor God.

4) It is because of my calling that I must preach. Parents often go to great lengths to coerce their children to try eating vegetables. The parents consider it a noteworthy success when their child finally eats a spoonful of whatever new item has been prepared. Though it is encouraging to witness an accomplishment like this, wouldn't it be a happier occasion if they ate the vegetables because they wanted to? We should naturally feel a compelling desire to preach. There must be a sense of duty within our hearts that says "Woe is me if I do not preach the gospel!" Free Will Baptist Home Missions Director Larry Powell reminded me once that his personal battle cry for ministry is "Souls for Jesus!" What is your personal battle cry?

If we preachers wish to bring about change in the lives of those who hear us, we must first realize the Holy Spirit is who changes lives. Thus, we must prepare faithfully, preach Christ and not opinion, and remember that our calling means that we ought to do nothing except be focused on the Kingdom. Let us thank God daily for the opportunity to do His noble work.


