The consistent comment heard by the State Executive Secretary in recent weeks has been that this year's State Meeting was an exceptional good meeting. The Preaching, the Singing, the Food, the Fellowship, the Business, and the way everything seemed to go so smoothly all combined to bless hearts and allow us to finish by noon on Friday (This is getting to be a habit!).

Especially appreciated was the great job done by Pastor Larry McAlister, Gilead FWB Church, and the Eastern Conference. They were exceptional hosts and they are to be commended for their good work.



Here are a few Highlights:

- One of the first business items was the report of the Children's Home audit by a representative of Rabon and Rabon Certified Public Accountants. A clean audit was presented and everyone was so satisfied until not a single question was asked about the finances of the Children's Home.
- The Relocation Study Proposal presented by the State Executive Secretary was approved with the added provision that State Moderator, Sherwood Lee: Children's Home Board Director, Tim Hackett; and the State Executive Sec-



North Spartanburg FWB Church News- Submitted by Pastor Russell McCoy:

We are hoping for a great year this year here at North Spartanburg. God is starting to work in our church. We are beginning to have more youth attending and we have a new choir leader and piano player.

We have hosted for almost a year, the "Kingdom Christian Academy" that holds school in our fellowship hall each Wednesday night. The classes are for people who dropped out of school for whatever reason who desire to have a high school diploma. They attend classes for 7 weeks. They have private tutoring to help them get their education. The youngest has been 17, and the oldest 61. At



the end of their 7 weeks, we have a graduation program for them at the church. The ones that graduate wear their cap and gowns just like regular high school graduations. There is a church ceremony as well as their receiving their diplomas. We have seen close to 70 people graduate, and at one graduation we had over 400 in attendance. Praise God it was wonderful to see that many people in GOD's house at one time.

Also, for about six months now we have been sharing our sanctuary with "The Ukrainian Church." We could not understand them nor they us, so we have split services. The Holy Spirit is so strong. When we attend, they have an interpreter for us. It is AWESOME. Their attendance is about 60 on Sunday's and close to 40 on prayer meeting night, and around 20 on youth night. They are so gracious. Constantly thanking us for helping them to have a place to worship GOD. We, as Americans, take it for granted. One should just listen to their testimonies about how it was in their country and how glad they are to be here.



Converse FWB Church was organized May 27, 1956 in an old furniture store building in Converse. The church remained there until the early 1960s when the existing building was built on the corner of Cherry Hill and Old Converse roads. The basement was built first and the upper floor was added later and served as the permanent sanctuary. Rev. Todd Black was called as the seventh pastor in November of 2002 and immediately passed on a vision of growth

through keeping Christ first, having healthy biblically trained families, and soul winning. That is why more than 125 souls have come to know Christ as their Savior during the past three years.

Not only were lives changed but many families have been repaired, which led to the church changing its name to Turning Point FWB Church. Property was purchased in April of 2004 for a new church, and construction of the 11,000 square-foot

facility began in March of 2005. The new building has a 300-seat sanctuary, office space, 10 classrooms, and a kitchen and fellowship hall. Including property, the building, and the furnishings the Church has a \$1 million campus situated just off the north intersection of Interstate 85 and Business 85, Spartanburg.

Turning Point had their first service in the new building on Sunday, Jan 22, 2006 with 7 souls saved (Glory!) and record attendance in Sunday School and the Worship Service.

This is Issue 6 of Volume 1 of "At Your Service", an email publication of the FWB Board of Retirement. The information provided in this issue is so useful to churches until it is being reprinted.

A Gift That Keeps on Giving

Has giving to your pastor on Pastor Appreciation Sunday become a chore? How many more suits does he need? Does giving him a gift certificate to a nice restaurant really signify the appreciation that you have for all his dedicated service? Besides, do you realize that all those gifts are taxable income to the pastor and their value must be reported on his W-2 form as Box 1 income?

Even a "love offering" taken on Pastor Appreciation Sunday, where members write checks payable to the local church and then the church provides one check to the pastor, is taxable income to the pastor and must be reported on his W-2 tax form from the church.

All of these tax rules leave many churches looking for a better solution to bless their pastor now and in the future – and without the gifts being taxable. The Board of Retirement has just the solution. Consider making either a one time gift or continuing monthly gifts to your pastor's Retirement Account. It will truly be a gift that keeps on giving.

One-time gifts are rather simple. The church can either designate a particular amount in their annual budget for pastor appreciation or they can take up an offering for such. The amount designated or given can then be forwarded to the Board of Retirement in the pastor's name as a contribution from the church. The special pastor's appreciation contribution, plus the regular contributions sent to the Board of Retirement for the pastor's retirement account, can be up to \$44,000 in 2006.

Besides giving a one-time gift, the church should also consider increasing their monthly contribution to the pastor's retirement account. While we suggest that the local church contribute a minimum of five percent (5%) of the pastor's compensation to his retirement account, the church might consider making an additional contribution for each year he serves the church. For example, after a pastor has served the church longer than three years, the church could increase his retirement plan contribution by one percent (1%) each year. Therefore, a pastor who has served a church for 10 years would be receiving an annual retirement contribution of 12% of his compensation.

A gift made by the church to the pastor's retirement account, whether such is a one-time gift or an additional amount given each month, is not taxable to the pastor at the time the contribution is made. As long as the funds stay in the pastor's retirement account, the earnings on the contributions are also not taxable. And finally, if the pastor takes distributions from his account in retirement and uses those distributions for housing expenses, even that amount can be shielded from tax liability because of its' status as ministerial housing allowance. In essence, the church's gift has appreciated in value over the years and is still not taxable to the retired pastor in retirement. What a tremendous way to bless your pastor with a tax-free gift. It truly is a gift that keeps on giving.

The evidence is indisputable that churches see their greatest growth with pastors who have served the church for longer than 10 years. So to see your church grow, you should take care of your pastor. He certainly is worthy of such blessings.
