SC State Association Adopts Resolutions

During its 1996 annual session, the SC State Association of Free Will Baptists adopted three resolutions concerning issues affecting all Free Will Baptists. They are:

- (1) Concerning the '96 Election. "...that we encourage our pastors and their respective congregations to prayerfully exercise this great privilege and constitutional right in voting for the candidate(s) that they feel God would be pleased with to serve in these respective offices."
- (2) Concerning the Rise of Cults. "... that we commit ourselves to the task of encouraging our church and youth leaders to arm themselves with as much information as is necessary to 1) recognize these groups, their symbols, beliefs and activities, and 2) warn our young men and women to avoid them with strong biblical admonitions and conviction, and 3) reprove those who are currently active in such groups to withdraw from them immediately."
- (3) Concerning the 1995 Leadership Conference Committee Report. "...that the South Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists go on record as commending the committee on their report and the spirit that is evident by the members who drew up this report..."

Norwood Gibson Receives Back Salary

During the annual meeting of the South Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists, the Promotional Office report indicated that not all of Brother Gibson's salary and benefits for 1994 and 1995 had been paid. After closing out the Promotional Office books for February, 1996, there was a balance of \$5,505.26 in the account. Brother Gibson was able, therefore, to draw all \$4,881.14 due him in back salary and benefits (\$706.14 in retirement and insurance benefits, \$1,300 in housing, \$2,575 in salary and \$300 for his 1995 Christmas bonus). The Promotional Office began March 1996 with a positive balance of \$624.12. Praise God for His faithfulness!



Operation Mexico: "Touched by Love!"

Operation Mexico was a joint effort of Black River and Happy Home Free Will Baptist Chruches in Andrews, SC. The purpose of the seventeen member team was to assist in the building of Ebenezer FWB Church in Reynosa, Mexico while experiencing first hand what the mission field is like.

The team left Charleston on Saturday, February 10 and arrived in McAllen, Texas that evening. On Sunday morning, they attended services at the First Church in Weslaco, Texas. That afternoon they traveled to Progresso, Mexico for their first taste of what Mexican life is really like. That evening, they attedended services with the Ebenezer Church in Reynosa.

The team began each day with devotions given by a different member of the team. There were daily tours into the community to meet the people. Each evening they would meet and spend hours talking about the day's experiences.

Monday through Wednesday, the team saw long days of placing steel for the roof, placing the roof, mixing concrete by hand, and pouring the stage area of the church.

On Thursday, they took the day off for shopping and sightseeing in Reynosa. That evening, they saw the work of their hands come alive as over 150 men, women and children filled the newly constructed building for a worship service. Through a translator, the team members were able to share their hearts with the people. According to John Hudson, pastor of Black River, "The people where touched by our love and work for them; we were touched by their love and kindness to us."

On Friday the team spent the day handing out tracts in the Reynosa community, a 3/4 square mile area with 8,800 people. The tracks had been provided by the Olive Branch Book Store in Georgetown, SC. The team spent Saturday sightseeing and shopping before returning home on Sunday, leaving behind a part of each of themselves with their brothers and sisters in Reynosa.

The entire team gives a special thanks to the James Munseys, Director of the Mexican work, and the Bud Bivens, home missionaries to Mexico, who met them at the provided transportation airport, translated for them.


Bible Readers Honored

First Kingstree Builds Family Life Center



On January 24, 1996, the First Free Will Baptist Church at Kingstree completed construction on the shell of their new eight thousand square foot Family Life Center. In September 1995, the Church voted to build the facility and construction began the following November. Though the present value of the new facility is \$90,000, actual costs were only \$50,000. The men of the Church prepared the footings for the concrete floor and are planning to finish the inside as time and funds permit. When completed, the Family Life Center will feature a full length basketball court, a modern kitchen, restrooms, a nursery and a storage room.

Maranatha Christian School Raises Funds For Children's Home

Following a tradition of many years, Maranatha Christian School turned attention to others during the Christmas season. The Free Will Baptist Children's Home at Turbeville was chosen to be the recipient of the funds raised in 1995. Rev. James Wilhide, Director of the Home, spoke during the chapel service on December 7 and attended the school's Christmas program on December 12. Special chapel offerings, the offering during the Christmas program, and various means of children giving in their classes netted \$1,018.01 for the Home. In keeping with the spirit of Christmas, this
