

South Carolina Roll Call Sunday Breaks Milestones

According to statistical information received on Roll Call Sunday, March 28, 1996, South Carolina Free Will Baptist Church attendance increased by 15% in 1996. One hundred nineteen churches reported a total attendance of 13,179 for an average attendance of 110 people per church. This set a new milestone for South Carolina, marking the first time that this average exceeded 100. The average attendance for 1995 was 98 per church. The greatest blessing of the day, however, was the 133 decisions made for God. This, too, was a new milestone.

Catch the excitement as twenty-six people leave Maranatha Christian School. We promenade on the Champs-Elysees, gaze at Paris from the Eiffel Towel, view art at the Louvre, walk through the Hall of Mirrors at Versailles. We travel to the foot of the mattehorn, retrace the steps of John Wesley in London, and view the White Cliffs of Dover.

Moving at 180 miles an hour on the TGV (train), we go to St. Nazaire, France, where Jerry and Barbara Gibbs and people from their church greet us. We go to the church for pizza and fellowship. Students nervously await assignments to home in which they will spend the next three nights. God went ahead of us to place people in the right spots. Soon, French and American youth are having a great time. Come Tuesday, departure time, tears would be shed with the goodbyes.

The Sunday service brings special blessings. There are 125 people present, a far cry form the six or eight that Bro. Jerry remembers being in services over twenty years ago. We participate in communion, using the common cup as is the custom in France. The music is excellent. An elderly lady read an original poem with such meaning that I asked Barb to tell me about her. She and her husband went to St. Nazaire to begin a church. The man died before a work was established. This dear lady prayed two years for God to send someone to start a church. The arrival of Jerry and Barb Gibbs is the answer to her prayers. In a country smaller than Texas where only 1.77% of the 57 million population is Christian, we are blessed to worship and fellowship with some of God's finest servants! (Continued page 2)

The Oneness He Brings, continued

Three Free Will Baptist Churches meet for fellowship at Pervanchere Chateaux near Nantes on Monday after Easter. There is lots of food, perhaps a characteristic of Free Will Baptists everywhere! Young people divide into teams for "the hunt" after lunch. They search for answers to Bible questions and quote Scripture verses. Each group makes a cross from sticks. Later, we gather around on the ground and on huge stumps. We are touched as we sang such hymns as Blessed Assurance and What a Friend, some verses in English and some in French. Both French and Americans give testimonies. It is evident that these believers know God; there is a strong sense of unity. "There's a quiet understanding when we're gathered in the Spirit . . . We Know when we're together, sharing love and understanding that our brothers and sisters feel the oneness that He brings," prayed an English pastor. Afterwards, we go back to St. Nazaire where hungry Americans and French eat hamburgers at McDonald's.

I recall Psalms as I view the aweinspiring Alps. Truly, they are the work of the Lord. God existed before the mountains (Ps. 90:2). God makes us glad through his works (Ps. 92:4). Words don't convey the grandeur, the depth of the valleys, the height of the mountains. God's presence is real as we ride the Glacier Express and walk the streets of Lucerne, Zermat, and Genevawhere we visit the Wall of the Reformation.

All Aboard! It is the ferry across the English Channel going to Dover. We journey to Canterbury Cathedral, made famous by Chaucer. We hear the pipe organ and the choir practicing for Evensong. It is on to London for a traditional fish and chips meal. We attend a service at the Metropolitan Tabernacle, the church founded by Charles Spurgeon. As one man said, "All that remains the same from Spurgeon's time is the message. We don't want icons or memorials."

All that remains for us is a long trip back to Florence. Well, not exactly. Each person who went on this trip is different for having gone. Christ is for the whole world, not just for those who are like us. Little does it matter the language we speak or the color of our skin. Christ died for all; the message has not changed. What are we doing to get the message to others? We can pray for Alain Dupoue, Thierry Boistuand, Brigitte and Gerard Payen, and Harry and Dany Atkisson to be saved. They attend services often at the Eglise Baptiste Libre in St. Nazaire.

In March 1995, they began a building program on the newly acquired property. A lovely sanctuary, educational facility and fellowship hall were completed in December of that year. 




