Report of the 1997 National Association Cincinnati, Ohio

A total of 6,774 people registered in the three concurrent national conventions which met July 20-24 in Cincinnati, Ohio. The National Association registered 774 ordained ministers, 124 deacons, 60 local church delegates, 73 state delegates, 76 home missionaries and 38 foreign missionaries. The National Youth Conference registered 2,105 and the WNAC, 836.

A \$16 million denominational budget was adopted. It included \$5 million for foreign missions, \$3.8 million for the Bible College, \$3 million for Home Missions and \$2.9 million for Sunday School and Church Training.

The convention worship services featured messages from the Reverends Robert Prichard, Ohio; Matt Upton, California; Earl Hendrix, South Carolina; Melvin Worthington, Tennessee; and Jerry Norris, Missouri. The special music was, according to many attendees, some of the best ever. The traditional Wednesday evening

missionary offering exceeded \$24,000. All undesignated gifts were divided between home and foreign missions.

Layman Tedford Rider of Desloge, Missouri, was named Layman of the Year. Robbie Robinson, a member

of Horse Branch FWB Church, Turbeville, was named Runner-Up. Congratulations Brother Robbie!

Jackson Watts, Horse Branch, won first place in

sixth grade Bible Sword Drill and the Horse Branch Bible Bowl team won third place during the NYC competition. Praise the Lord for these young people!

During its business session, the National Association of Free Will Baptists reaffirmed its traditional stand concerning ecclesiastical separation by voting 298-236 to oppose the Promise Keepers movement.

The 1998 session of the National Association will meet at the Tulsa Convention Center in Tulsa, Oklahoma, on July 12-16.

Four Weeks In China

Hi! My name is Darla Kirby. I am a member of Bethany FWB Church in Timmonsville, SC. This summer I had the unique opportunity to teach English in the farming city of Dujiangyan in the Sichuan Province of the Peoples Republic of China. I heard about this exciting opportunity while attending Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, TN.

I went to China as part of a team of Christian young people. We were commissioned by the English Language Institute, China (ELIC), and interdenominational non-profit organization. ELIC places Christian teachers in China, Mongolia, and Vietnam. Its purpose is "service and witness to the glory of God in Asia."

My trip started when I flew to Los Angeles, CA, on June 24 for teacher training. I returned to LA about five weeks later on August 1, four of which were spent in China.



When I first arrived in China, I had a hard time adjusting. After a while, things started falling into place. I taught 15 students, ages 7 to 12. Most of them knew very little English. This communication barrier was very frustrating. Through it all, however, I learned that when I'm weak, He is

strong. God showed me His power in many ways. Several unexpected things happened that brought God glory. Indeed, I have been richly blessed by having this opportunity.

I want to challenge you to consider working cross-culturally. Please be sensitive to God's will for your life. The harvest is plenteous but the laborers are few!
