

State Association Adopts New Foreign Missions Plan of Support

The 1997 Annual Session of the State Association adopted a new South Carolina Foreign Missions Plan of Support. The Plan is designed to underwrite the support of Free Will Baptist foreign missionaries having strong residency ties to South Carolina. Missionaries and budgets adopted for 1997 are listed below.

To understand the above chart, consider the Pooles, for example. The Poole's national budget for 1997 is \$68,510. South Carolina has adopted 50% of their support, which is \$34,255. When funds come in designated to the South Carolina Foreign Missions Plan of Support, the Pooles will receive 15.4 cents of every dollar. All gifts designated for the Pooles (or other missionaries) will always go to their account.

The Plan is based on the share concept. The total projected budget for the year 2000 is \$264,000. That figure was divided into 2000 annual shares of \$132 each. Thus, to underwrite the 1997 budget of \$222,230, a total of 1,684 shares will have to be adopted. The Plan's goal is to raise all 2000 shares by the year 2000!

It will take most of 1997 to educate our people about the Plan and to implement it across the State. The National Foreign Missions Department is preparing the publicity materials and Promotional Director Ron Moore is developing a study course on the Plan. A Foreign Missions Task Force will be assembled to promote the Plan, evaluate its effectiveness, and to recommend any changes at next year's Annual Session.

South Carolina Ranks 6th in Foreign Missions Giving

South Carolina gave \$252,241.77 toward their goal of \$263,670.68 in 1996. That is an increase of 1% over 1995. Our churches are to be commended for their efforts. South Carolina ranked number six among churches in the National Association.

Fifteen churches exceeded \$5,000 in giving. They are:

An analysis of giving by churches shows that 90 churches in South Carolina gave to foreign missions in 1996. Forthy churches gave between \$1 and \$1,000; thirty-five gave between \$1,000 and \$5,000; and, as listed above, fifteen churches gave over \$5,000.

Q-Brother Eddie, would you share your testimony with us? I would love to. I was saved at Bethany FWB Church, Timmonsville, when I was six. However, it was not until the twelfth grade, while I was attending Peace FWB Church in Florence, that I became serious about working for the Lord. I had always been interested in business so I went to Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, to prepare myself to serve Him better. After graduation in 1994 I returned to Florence and worked part-time as youth pastor at Bethany.
