State Executive Committee to Hold Special Session

The Executive Committee of the South Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists has called a special session to be held at the Columbia Original Free Will Baptist Church on Tuesday, August 17, at 7:00 P.M. According to Rev. Sherwood Lee, moderator of the State Association, this extraordinary action is being taken in an effort to educate, organize and motivate South Carolina Free Will Baptists to vote against the November 2nd referendum on video poker. "Video gambling is a sin against God and a curse upon the moral fiber and economic health of South Carolina," says Brother Lee. "Only time will reveal the staggering costs, in terms of lost human dignity and squandered financial resources, that have been inflicted upon this state so that greedy businessmen can reap their riches. . . . Citizens of South Carolina have a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to remove video gambling from our state via the November 2nd referendum. We must act quickly and decisively," he continues, "if Free Will Baptists are to do their part. Our people must be educated, motivated and mobilized. Because time is short and the stakes are so high, urgency is required."

The Executive Committees of the seven conferences/associations in the South Carolina State Association are requested to attend along with Free Will Baptist pastors, preachers and other interested persons. Brother Lee says, "Qualified men who are already involved in the struggle to defeat video gambling at the poles will share information and strategies that can save valuable preparation time. Packets containing information and ideas that can be utilized on the local church level will be distributed."

ATTENTION all Free Will Baptist pastors and people

in South Carolina, as Brother Lee has said, we have a once-in-alifetime opportunity to make a difference

in the quality of life among South Carolinians by voting "NO" on the

November 2nd referendum on video poker. I urge you to attend the Executive Committee's special session to be held in Columbia on August 17, 1999.

If there was ever a clear-cut moral issue on the ballot that Christians should vote against, South Carolina's referendum on video poker is certainly it. Your presence and participation in this special session is not only requested, it is required if we are going to mobilize our people in an effort to defeat it and rid our state of this devastating vice. Consider the following facts:*

- ★ Though video poker is a \$2 billion industry in South Carolina and has grown over 40% in the last year, "The society and economy of South Carolina loses over \$424 million each year because of the [collective social and economic cost of these] machines."
- ★ Twenty percent of all video gambling players in South Carolina are problem gamblers; 33% have spent the last dollar in their pocket on these games; 19% have thought about ways to get more money; 28% of players feel guilty about playing the games; and, 5% have considered suicide.

The economic and human costs of video poker are high. God has given us an opportunity to stand against it. Help us mobilize our people to defeat the referendum!


Southoak Changes Name to Grace Fellowship
