Proceedings of the State Association

THURSDAY MORNING, NOVEMBER 12, 1964

Devotions began at 10:00 A.M. Song service led by Rev. Jack Millwood. Prayer by Rev. Reedy Saverance. Scripture from Matthew 5:11, was ably commented upon by Rev. Robert Edwards. The need for living so that evil spoken against us would be false, was stressed.

Call to order by Moderator. Everyone was made to feel welcome by Rev. Malcolm Harrison, pastor of Host Church. Response by Rev. Edison Kirby.

Visitors were welcomed and extended all rights except that of voting.

Delegates, Ministers and Visitors were registered.

The moderator's message consisted of only a few timely remarks closing by inviting everyone to join him around the altar for prayer for the State Association and deeper consecration of our lives to the Lord's service.

Motion adopted that the chair appoint all temporary committees of the association. The following were appointed:

Nominating: Rev. Gene Anderson, Rev. Ansil Smith, Mr. Louis Bass Hanna, Mr. William Evens.

Resolution: Rev. J. A. Hucks, Mr. C. J. Poston, Rev. Clarence Lambert, and Mr. Herbert Israll.

Finance: Rev. Judson Osborne, Mrs. O. F. Lauter, and Mrs. Flora Millwood.

Finance Committee to act as treasurer Thursday only in absence of treasurer.

Association recessed for morning worship service. Everyone enjoyed the song service led by Rev. Jack Millwood. Prayer by Rev. Raymond Riggs. Message based on St. Luke, chapter 19, verse 13. Text: "Occupy till I Come," was very forcibly presented by Rev. Reedy Saverance. Over and over again he stressed the fact that every Christian should do everything in his power to get the gospel to everyone. This to include our next door neighbor.

Recess at noon for lunch and fellowship. A most enjoyable meal was furnished by the Host Church.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Devotions, Rev. Raymond Riggs. He said Christians should always strive to bring about God's purpose. That is bringing the lost to Christ.

Home Mission Board report given by Mr. Marion Todd. Report received (CF Appendix I) also a motion to disband the Home Mission Board was adopted after some discussion.

A motion was received and adopted to divide all money left in treasury equally between the Eastern, Central, and Beaver Creek Conference. S. C. Conference to receive deed to church property. Tent to remain in State Association. Trustees to be in charge of same.

Board given rising vote of thanks for splendid work done.

Report of Promotional Secretary (see appendix II). State paper in red. A small offering was made. Delegates were asked to return home and send an offering to Promotional Secretary to help defray expenses and help keep our fine State paper coming to us.

Amendment to By-Laws that Constitution and By-Laws be published in minutes each year was approved.

Report of State Sunday School Board was received and approved (see appendix III).

The work of our Bible College in Nashville, Tenn., was very ably presented by Rev. Charles Thigpen. He said that one of the Devil's first attacks was in our education work.

Superannuation report received as information.

Public Morals Committee report. (MSA) that our state clerk write a letter to S. C. Attorney General concerning obscene literature being displayed and sold in our state (see appendix IV), also each Free Will Baptist minister in state try to get an article printed in local paper concerning this problem.

Motion to visit with nearby Oak Grove Church for Thursday night worship service.

Report on Children's Home by Rev. Richburg received as information (see appendix VIII).

FRIDAY MORNING

Devotions, song, prayer, and brief comments on Eph. Ch. 5 V. 1 stating the necessity of being true followers of God, by Rev. Bennie Turner.

State Treasurer's report received as information (see appendix V).

Report on State Women's Auxiliary by Mrs. Paul Sheehan received as information (see appendix VI).

Christian Education report received as information. Some revision of Poston-Baggett Memorial Loan Fund were recommended and approved (see appendix VII).

Motion adopted that delegates and ministers be registered as they enter 1965 association, also a program be sent two weeks in advance of each Association meeting to each church in the State Association. Also one to the National Association.

A committee consisting of Mr. Marion Todd, Rev. Paul Sheehan, Mr. Joe Lynch, Rev. Bennie Turner, and Rev. Reedy Saverance was appointed by the chair and approved by the Association to revise Constitution and By-Laws and to include duties of all officers of the State Association.

A very informative and interesting group insurance plan for the ministers in our state was discussed. The plan was accepted and put in effect as soon as practical.

Recess for morning worship. Devotion, song, prayer by Rev. Raymond Riggs. Message by Rev. Sammy Wilkenson, missionary to Brazil. Scripture, John Ch. 6, Vs. 25-28. Rev. Wilkenson said we should do all in our power to carry on Christ's work stressing the fact that every Christian has an equal responsibility to God for getting the gospel to everyone. Too many of us would rather be boss than servant. God would like work to go along with our singing and shouting. He also said we as Christians are getting too fat by not working for Christ.

Fellowship and lunch hour was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Lunch was furnished by the churches of the Central Association,

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Devotion, song and prayer. Scripture, II Timothy, Ch. 2. Comments by Mr. Marion Todd. He stated the necessity of endurance and hard work by laymen, saying that the growth of any church depends very much on the laymen who live and work in the church community.

Report of National Sunday School Board. The new Sunday School literature based on our own Free Will Baptist scripture outline will be available from the Free Will Baptist press in Nashville, Tennessee, by first quarter in 1966. We have thirty-five churches in South Carolina now using some Sunday School literature from the Free Will Baptist press in Nashville, Tennessee. The Free Will Baptist press in Ayden, N. C., will continue to use scripture text based on suggestions by the International Sunday School Lessons. They will also continue to publish Free Will Baptist League supplies.

A study by the Revision Board of a change in the name of our church League. Their recommendation is to be presented to the State Association in their 1965 session.

A very informative report was given by National Home Mission Board. The necessity of being faithful and working hard was stressed. The pressing need of churches in the many unchurched areas was brought to our attention also stating that only about one-fifth of our churches in the United States are teaching the true gospel. Also, our foreign mission work depends on our home mission work,

The need of a men's organization in our church was made by Mr. Marion Todd. Only a very few of our churches have such working groups.

The Association approved a motion that \$50.00 be paid out of our treasury toward indebtedness of the past.

Resolution Committee, no report. An offering of \$30.34 was made for foreign missions.

Moderator and clerk to choose delegates to National Association.

Motion to adjourn (MSA).

The 1965 meeting of the State Association to be with Mill Branch Church of the Eastern Conference.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

We recommend to the State Association a few revisions in the rules that govern the Poston-Baggette Memorial Loan Fund.

- 1. That rule number 3 be extended to read: "with ministerial students preferable." Thus making rule number 3 read "The assistance is available to any qualified person entering our Free Will Baptist Bible College or Mount Olive Junior College for any phase of full-time Christian service with ministerial students preferable." (MSA)
- 2. That rule number 4, section "a" delete the words in parenthesis. "The loan will be secured by a promissory note signed by the applicant and cosigned by his/her church (or a person who has sufficient collateral) to guarantee the collection of said note. (MSA)

We also recommend that since Brother Kenneth Faison will be leaving the state, Brother David Hutchinson serve as acting Field Director of Christian Education until the State Association can meet and elect someone to fill this vacancy.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Of the South Carolina State Association Of Original Free Will Baptists

PREAMBLE: We, the officials, ministers and delegates of this the South Carolina State Association of Original Free Will Baptists, while in session at Una Church, Spartanburg, South Carolina, November 13, 14, 1946, do accept and adopt the foregoing constitution and by-laws.

ARTICLE ONE: This body shall be known henceforth as the South Carolina State Association of Original Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE TWO: It shall be the purpose of this organization to cooperate with the National Association in its efforts to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of the Free Will Baptist church, for the promotion of home and foreign missions, Christian education, Sunday school, Free Will Baptist leagues, superannuation, and woman's auxiliary work and for the extension of the Kingdom of God in general.

ARTICLE THREE:

SECTION ONE: This association shall consist of delegates duly appointed or elected by the church or organizations to represent, and ordain and license Free Will Baptist ministers, who are of good repute in the Original Free Will Baptist Church, and who reside in South Carolina, or hold membership in, or pastor a church in South Carolina.

SECTION TWO: Each annual association and quarterly conference may represent in this association on the basis of two delegates for each association or quarterly conference of one thousand members or less, and one delegate for each additional thousand members or fractions thereof.

SECTION THREE: Any local church that desires may send an additional delegate, and each church shall send a contribution of \$10.00 or more. Each member association and quarterly meeting shall also be requested to send a representative fee of one dollar per church.

ARTICLE FOUR: This association shall have an executive committee of five, composed of ordained ministers and lay members in good standing in the association, one to be elected by this body each year for a five year term, to act officially in the event any case may arise in this association, when, and only when it is deemed necessary or expedient for the best interest of the cause of the church in general.

ARTICLE FIVE: The officers of this association shall be a president, first, second, and third vice-president, a corresponding secretary, a recording secretary, and a treasurer and a reading clerk. Said reading clerk to take the place of the recording secretary in his absence.

These officers shall be elected by the association to serve a term of two years.

ARTICLE SEVEN: All missionaries, teachers and Christian workers approved, appointed, or supported by this association must be fundamental in their views of the Bible and its teachings, and in harmony with the doctrines of the Original Free Will Baptist Church. They must also give evidence of genuine Christian piety, for fervent zeal in the service of Christ, and of ability to do the work for which they are considered.

ARTICLE EIGHT: This association shall hold its meeting annually on Thursday and Friday of the week between the second and the third Sundays in November, beginning at 10:00 a.m., unless, or until, some change of the time of the year shall be thought best.

ARTICLE NINE: Articles may be altered or amended at any regular session of the association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present providing the change is recommended at least one day before the vote is taken.

BY-LAWS OF THE ASSOCIATION

1. A portion of the Scripture shall be read and prayer offered at the beginning of each morning and afternoon session of the association and prayer shall be offered at the close of each session.

This is to be done by the president or someone appointed by him.

2. The president or vice-president shall call the association to order at the hour designated by the program committee.

When neither the president nor the vice-president is present, the recording secretary shall call the association to order and a president pro tem shall be elected by the body, who shall preside for that session of the association.

- 3. It shall be the duty of the recording secretary to enroll the delegates of the association who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their right to seats therein, and those enrolled by the secretary shall compose the association.
- 4. Each organization represented in the association shall send into the association as large a contribution as they can from time to time. This money to be used to meet the expenses of the association and to promote the work it undertakes.
- 5. On the first day of the association meeting the president shall appoint a resolution committee to consist of three members, all resolutions not connected with the reports of boards and committees shall be referred to this committee, which shall report on all resolutions referred to it, with or without recommendation.

- 6. The officers of the association, the departmental secretaries, the executive committee, and all boards shall be elected by the association. All other committees may be either appointed by the president or elected by the body.
- 7. In the event of a standing executive committee, the members shall be elected for a term of five years except the first four elected, who shall serve period of one, two, three, and four years, respectively.
- 8. The duties of the executive committee shall be as follows: (1) To act for the association on matters that demand its consideration between the regular annual sessions of the association. (2) To have oversight of arrangements for meetings of the association with authority to change, if necessary, the time and place of meeting. (3) To fill vacancies in the association that may be caused by death, resignation, etc., between the regular sessions of the association.
- 9. It shall be required of all members of the association to remain throughout the entire session, unless they are excused by a majority vote of the body.
- 10. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the president, and shall wait until he is recognized before speaking further.
- 11. The president shall not allow discussions that are unchristian in spirit and that tend to create envy and strife among the brethren, and anyone resenting the ruling of the president in such matters shall be liable to censure of the body.
- 12. No one shall be allowed to speak more than 15 minutes or more than twice on the same subject without permission of the body.
- 13. It shall be the duty of the president to have his annual message so prepared and arranged that it can be handed to the secretary for publication in the minutes of each session of the association.
- 14. The officers of this association, except that of the board of trustees and the executive committee, shall be for a term of two years.
- 15. These by-laws may be altered at any regular session of the association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, providing the change is recommended at least one day before the vote is taken.
