MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION of the SOUTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION of ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS

**MEETING WITH THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE
at the Horse Branch Free Will Baptist Church
Turbeville, South Carolina**

February 16 - 17, 1978

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

The Thirty-sixth annual session of the South Carolina State Association of Original Free Will Baptists opened with the singing of "At Calvary", directed by Rev. Reedy Saverance, with Bro. Lavern Hanna at the piano. Rev. Bobby Bowers led us in prayer.

The Morning Devotion was given by Rev. Tommy Lovern of the Eastern Conference. He used Ezekiel 22:30 as a basis for his message. He spoke on the subject "The Need for Men who will Stand". He pointed out that we will not stand alone, but God will stand with us. To illustrate this point he used the stand of Shamgar in Judges 3:31, of Eleazer in II Samuel 23:8-9, and of Shammah in II Samuel 23:10-11.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. Norwood Gibson, after which Rev. Wilburn Beasley, the host pastor, gave the welcome to those in attendance.

The response was given by the Assistant Moderator, Rev. Paul Clayton.

MSC that the delegates be seated.

Rev. Rudy Woods, Jr. was nominated to serve as clerk in the absence of Rev. J.B. Rice. He was elected by acclamation.

MSC that the program be approved.

The Moderator appointed the following men to serve on the Committee on Committees: Rev. Van Powell, Chairman; Rev. Joe Cagle, Rev. Billy Baker, and Rev. L. H. Clayton.

We then recognized our visitors. The following new ministers were present: Rev. Wade Conger from Jefferson Road, Rev. Steve Cannon from Salem, Rev. Roy Duckett from Myrtle Beach, Rev. Tommy Lovern from Williams Hill, Rev. Theron Scott from New Town, and Rev. Ed Green from Westside. We had one visitor from the National Offices present, Rev. Harrell Harrison representing the National Sunday School Department.

~~Rev. Gibson announced that there were two displays for our benefit. One~~
contained materials for sale by the National Sunday School Department and the other was set up by the Boy Scouts of America. It was also announced that the Bobby Jackson Crusade would be held in Lake City August 20-25. Bro. Gibson also asked that each pastor and delegate fill out the question sheet from the Moderator so that the Executive Committee would have some idea as to which direction our state work needs to move.

Rev. Gibson then delivered the Moderator's Message. (See Appendix I) He closed his message by leading us in prayer for our state.

We then had a short recess.

MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

Rev. Reedy Saverance opened the Morning Worship Service by leading us in singing "Take The Name of Jesus with You", with Mrs. Jean Hyman at the piano. (Mrs. Hyman and Rev. Reedy Saverance filled these positions throughout the remainder of the State Association unless stated otherwise.) Rev. Fred Kirby led us in prayer.

Rev. Ed Green sang "My Jesus I Love Thee" as a special in song.

Rev. Billy Poteat, Pastor of the Pamplico Free Will Baptist Church, delivered the Morning Message on the subject "The Preciousness of the Lord Jesus Christ". He used I Peter 2:7 as his text and used the following outline:

- I. What Jesus Is More Precious Than
 - A. More Precious than Life
 - B. More Precious than Physical Comfort
 1. We must suffer first and be glorified later — I Peter 1:7,11; 5:1,10
 2. God's people have suffered — Hebrews 11:33-38
 3. Paul suffered — II Cor. 11:23-27; II Tim. 4:14-18
 - C. More Precious than any Mental Comfort or Discomfort — II Cor. 11:28
 - D. More Precious than any Material Gain — Moses — Hebrews 11:23-26
 - E. More Precious than any Accomplished Gain — Zachariah 4:6
 1. Jesus is the true source of power
 2. Through Jesus we are heirs of God and joint-heirs with Christ
 3. Through Jesus we are glorified and made sons of God — John 1:12
- II. Why Is Jesus Precious To Me
 - A. Because of what He has done for us
 1. Our Advocate-lawyer-mediator
 2. Our Substitute-propitiation
 - B. Because of what He is doing now
 1. Our Keeper
 2. Our Renewer
 - C. Because of what He is going to do in the future
 1. Be with us in death
 2. Provide a place for us

He closed his message with prayer.

After receiving instructions from the Host Pastor as to how we should line up for the noon meal, Rev. Ed Green dismissed us in prayer.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was opened with the singing of "When I See the Blood". Rev. Willie Justice led us in prayer.

Rev. Billy Baker of the Central Conference brought the afternoon devotion, using Colossians 2:1-8 as his text. He spoke on the subject "Beware" pointing out that we should first beware of people commercializing on God and second that we should beware of false doctrine.

The Committee on Committees reported. (See Appendix II) MSC to accept.

The Credentials Committee gave a partial report. (See Appendix III) MSC to accept.

We then took up the business that needed to be Laid on the Table. MS to add to the Field Directors of our Constitution a Senator for the Master's Men Department. MSC to Lay on the Table.

MSC to take off the Table a motion to increase our State Dues from \$20.00 to \$30.00. After a brief discussion and the defeat of a substitute motion, MSC to accept.

We then elected our delegate to the National Association from the Beaver Creek Association. Mr. Jimmy Miller and Mrs. Fran Porter were nominated. MSC that the nominations cease. Mr. Jimmy Miller was elected.

We then elected our General Board Member. Rev. Willie Justice and Rev. L.H. Clayton were nominated. MSC that the nominations cease. Rev. Willie Justice was elected.

The Report of the National Sunday School Department was given by Rev. Harrell Harrison. (See Appendix IV) He told us that FWB materials were now being printed in Portuguese. This report was accepted as information.

We then sang "He Keeps Me Singing".

Rev. Harrell Harrison presented a Seminar on Sunday School Organization and Motivation. (See Appendix V)

We then sang "Tell Me the Old Old Story" with Mrs. Reed playing the Piano.

The Executive Committee gave their report. (See Appendix VI) MSC to accept this report as a whole.

We then had announcements and Rev. Billy Poteat dismissed us in a word of prayer.

THURSDAY NIGHT SESSION

We opened the Evening Service by singing "The Old Account was Settled". Rev. David Hutchinson led us in prayer. Rev. Norwood Gibson gave a word of welcome and made several announcements. The FWB Youth Rally was mentioned. (See Appendix VII) The Bobby Jackson Crusade was Announced. (See Appendix VIII)

We then sang "Victory in Jesus".

Our special music was provided by the King's Messengers from the First FWB Church in Florence. They sang "I Keep Falling in Love With Him" and "It Could Happen in a Moment". We then found out the names of all the churches present. The King's Messengers then sang "I'm a Millionaire" and "It's Just a Matter of Time".

Rev. Bob Shockey from the National Home Mission Board was our speaker for the Evening Message. He spoke on "The Second Coming of the Lord" using I Thess. 4:13-18 as his text. After a word of prayer he introduced his message by pointing out that 1 out of every 30 verses speaks of the Lord's Coming and that for every 1 time the Lord's First Coming is mentioned His Second Coming is mentioned 8 times. He used the following outline:

- I. Why Jesus Came the First Time
 - A. Fulfill the Law — His Life
 - B. Put Away Sin — His Death
 - C. Abolish Death — His Resurrection
- II. The Second Coming of the Lord
 - A. Testimonies of His Second Coming
 1. Jesus said He was coming
 2. Angels said He was coming
 3. Paul said He was coming
 4. Peter said He was coming
 5. John said He was coming
 - B. Type of His Second Coming
 1. Personal Coming
 2. Audible Coming
 3. Powerful Coming

C. Time of His Second Coming

1. Time of Moral and Spiritual Stupor
 - a. Corruption and violence
 - b. Homosexuality and sex perversion
2. Time when men are mocking God
3. Time When the wicked are ripe for destruction
4. Time when the righteous are ready to be redeemed

He then gave an invitation especially for preachers and layworkers to be prepared for His coming. We closed the service around the altar in prayer and were dismissed until the following morning.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

We opened the Friday Morning Session by singing "The Old-time Power". Rev. Rufus Coffee led us in prayer. Rev. Norwood Gibson welcomed each of us to the second day of our State Association and then made several announcements.

The Morning Devotion was given by Rev. Rudy Woods, Jr., of the South Carolina Conference. He spoke on the subject "Can These Bones Live?" using Ezekiel 37:1-10 as his text. He pointed out that churches today are like the bones in Ezekiel. The Country is full of them. They are open to the things of this world and as a result they are dry and dead. Two things are necessary if they are to live again. First, they must go back to the Word of God and second, they must be empowered and given life by the Holy Spirit.

Rev. Bob Shockey gave us a report from the National Home Missions Department. (See Appendix IX) He pointed out that most people have Cigarettes, fingernails, and coffee for breakfast. He also told us that 1 church dies every hour and that only 1 out of every 5 churches are preaching the Gospel. We accepted this report as information.

Bro. Shockey then presented a Seminar on Visitation and Soul-Winning. (See Appendix X) He pointed out that if we are following Christ we are fishers of men. If we are not fishers of men then we are not following Christ. He used the following Form when witnessing to people in their homes:

- F—family
- O—organization or job
- R—religion
- M—message—Gospel Witness

He also gave us the following 3 questions to ask in leading a person to make a decision:

- You do believe that God can save you?
- You do believe that God will save you?
- You do believe that God will save you right now?

We then had a brief recess.

FRIDAY MORNING WORSHIP

We opened the Morning Worship by singing "There is a Name I Love to Hear". Mrs. Sandy Tart sang a special in song entitled "I Have Returned". Rev. Irvin Hyman led us in prayer.

Rev. Bill Jacobs, Pastor of the Mullins-Marion Free Will Baptist Church in the Central Conference brought the Morning Message. He spoke on the subject "Quit You like Men and be Strong" using I Cor. 16:13 as his text. He used the

following outline:

- I. God needs men who will be strong in faith and in the truths of God's Word
Romans 4:20
 - II. God needs men of convictions — II Tim. 4:3,4
 - III. God needs men who are filled with the Holy Spirit
(He pointed out that some people were so worried about wild fire in their church that they end up with no fire)
 - IV. God needs men of prayer
 - V. God needs men of power
- Rev. Wilburn Beasley dismissed us for the noon meal in prayer.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

We opened the afternoon session by singing "When We All get to Heaven". Rev. Robert Rose led us in prayer.

Rev. David Hutchinson of the Beaver Creek Association brought our Afternoon Devotion. He used Matt. 28:16-20 as his text pointing out that we don't know what power we have through Jesus and that we need to claim that power. He then led us in a word of prayer.

The Credentials Committee gave their final report. (See Appendix XI) MSC to accept.

The Promotional Secretary reported. (See Appendix XII) He told us he was now printing 2000 papers at each printing. MSC to accept.

The Ladies Auxiliary reported. (See Appendix XIII) MSC to accept.

The Children's Home reported. (See Appendix XIV) MSC to accept.

The CTS Field Director reported. (See Appendix XV) MSC to accept.

The Field Director of Christian Education reported. (See Appendix XVI) MSC to accept

The Field Director of the State Board of Retirement reported. (See Appendix XVII) We are now supporting 7 retired ministers or their widows each month with a check for \$35.00. MSC to accept.

MSC to recommend to the State Board of Retirement to raise the monthly support for our retired ministers or their widows from \$35.00 to \$50.00.

We had no report from the Board of Education.

The Youth Camp and Treasurer's reports were given. (See Appendix XVIII) Youth Camp will be held July 31 - August 12 with the teenagers attending the first week. There will be a \$25.00 Camp Fee this year which is an increase of \$5.00 over last year. MSC to accept.

There was no report from the Church Loan Fund.

The Field Director for the State Home Mission Board. (See Appendix XIX) It was brought to our attention that we have 98 churches and 7 missions in the State of South Carolina. MSC to accept.

There was no report given by the Field Director of Foreign Missions, but we did receive a letter from the FWB Foreign Missions Department. (See Appendix XX)

The Resolutions Committee reported. (See Appendix XXI) MSC to accept. MSD for clerk to send a copy of the Resolutions Committee Report to each Church.

The Public Morals committee reported. (See Appendix XXII) They recommended that we readopt the report from our last meeting. MSC to accept.

The State CTS Convention reported. (See Appendixes XXIII and XXIV) MSC to accept.

The following churches in the South Carolina Conference were recognized for

having assisted the Host Church in providing the noon meals at our State Association: Free Will Baptist Bible Church, Florence; First Church, Florence; Fellowship Church, Florence; First Church, Darlington; Faith Church, Darlington; Bethany Church, Timmonville; and Lebanon Church, Effingham.

The Executive secretary of the National Association of FWB, Rev. Rufus Coffee, gave us a report. He told us of the work of the National Offices in producing Contact, a church directory, and tracts. He also informed us that any delegates sent from the local church to the National Associational Meeting who paid his own expense could deduct his expenses from his Income Tax. This report was accepted as information.

Rev. Paul Kettelman, the Director of Public Relations at the FWB Bible College, gave us his report. (See Appendix XXV) He pointed out that in our educational systems we were being influenced by the philosophy of humanism which teaches that there are no bad people only ignorant ones. He further pointed out that we are living in an age of apathy where people are willing to do anything for personal peace. This is also an age of affluence. We need to wake up to the need for true education based on the fear of the Lord. He also pointed out that 3 churches in South Carolina gave 40% of all that was given to the Bible College and that 8 churches gave 65%. Sixty-six churches did not give anything to the Bible College at all. This report was accepted as information.

We then sang "Saved By the Blood".

MSC to take the motion off the Table to establish the position of Senator for the Master's Men. MSC to adopt.

The Nominating Committee reported. (See Appendix XXVI) MSC to adopt item by item. The following changes were made in their original report: All present Field Directors were elected for another year; Mr. Fred Brackett was elected as the Senator for the Master's Men; and Rev. Rudy Woods, Jr. was elected to the Credentials Committee in the place of Rev. Robert Cooper who declined.

MSC that the State Clerk send a letter to each church which is delinquent in paying their State Dues reminding and encouraging them to pay their dues and that the Moderators in each Conference be sent a list of the churches in their Conference that are delinquent so that he too might encourage them to pay their dues.

Rev. Paul Kettelman said a few words in memory of Rev. Seldon Bullard. He then led us in a Memorial Prayer for Rev. Bullard, Rev. Malcum Harrellson, and Rev. E. P. Kirby.

The Moderator expressed his appreciation to all who had helped in making our State Association a success. Our next meeting will be at the First FWB Church in Greenville sponsored by the Beaver Creek Association.

MSC to adjourn. Rev. Robert Cooper dismissed us in prayer remembering many of our number who were sick.

APPENDIX I

THE GREAT COMMISSION AS IT APPLIES TO F.W.B. IN SOUTH CAROLINA — Matt. 28:18-20; Acts 1:8

Introduction — It is my understanding that the Moderator is to present a message to challenge and provoke the work of God in our State, so with your permission I'll share my heart with you as it relates to this subject.

- I. The great commission projects two purposes
 1. To preach the gospel to a world of sinners.
To teach and train the saints for the ministry
 - a. A balance of the teaching of the Word will produce SOUL WINNERS and SATISFIED SAINTS.
- II. The great commission was first given to eleven disciples. The Bible reveals the action taken in carrying out the commission.
 1. This action started as recorded in Acts chapter 2.
 2. The foundation of the Church, who is Christ was laid for the people. Additions to the church was the norm of the day. 3000, 5000, multitudes, great multitudes.
 3. Training process was set in motion.
 - a. It seems that this training was not too productive at first. It took a persecution to run them out of Jerusalem.
 - b. But once on the field things started happening.
- III. As it was first given to the eleven it has been given to every generation of believers and it is our great commission today.
 1. They had their Jerusalem — we have our city.
 2. They had their Judaea — we have our county.
 3. They had their Samaria — we have our state.
 4. They had their known world and we have ours.
 5. As the Jerusalem Church extended itself to the regions beyond, so must we extend our churches beyond its doors.
- IV. We have the message — we have the preachers — we have the organization — we have the mechanics, but we are not getting the job done.
 1. Let me share with you some reasons why I believe we are not making the progress we could be making.
 - a. First let me say it is not because of our peculiar petty and insignificant differences. I believe we have overcome these. (Jack Hyles in Texas at a colored church)
 - b. It's a lack of faith and trust in one another and God to step out into these untouched areas.
 - c. We are not properly using our man power — abilities and resources. By this I mean beyond the local church level.
 - (1) The local church is the highest level of authority. It is the pillar and ground of truth. The Bible is its sole authority of faith and rule of practice. There is no higher rule or ruler.
 - (2) ~~Because it is impossible for the local church to evangelize~~ and train a world, local churches come together in a cooperative effort for this task. Pooling our man power — talents — abilities and resources to get the job done. We call it a denomination.
 - (3) The various organizations that link us together is a servant to the church and not the church a servant to the organization. The organization does not dictate to the local church, but the local church dictates to the organization.

- (4) We have allowed our various organizations to become unprofitable servants.
- (a) The area conference should be a servant to its local churches.
 - (b) The State Association should be a servant to the area conferences and the local churches to do for them what they cannot do alone.
 - (c) The National Association should be a servant to the State, its Conference and local churches. Providing proper teaching training opportunities for our people. To enable the local church to have a part in a world wide ministry.

V. Now let me share with you some things which I believe will make our servants more profitable.

1. Rethink and reevaluate the potentials we have as Free Will Baptists. We are a sleeping giant — let's wake up.
2. Rethink and reevaluate the needs of our day and put our servants to work to meet them.
3. Be willing to put aside some old time customs and practices.
4. Let's agree on some needed works and on some reasonable and workable methods to get the job done, Trust God for the results and get at it.

Conclusion — I believe to some degree we are responsible for this flood of Apostate Christianity which is upon us. They are ensnaring precious souls and we need to do something about it.

Greetings in Jesus name.

Dr. Roger Reeds and the Sunday School Department staff wish for you a very profitable meeting of the State Association.

We trust that 1977 was a profitable year for Free Will Baptist churches and that your Sunday School enrollment of 13,600 was increased considerably. A number of other states have had good success with the new ATTACK enrollment concept. This plan will help you to double your enrollment by 1980.

The Spring enlargement campaign is entitled ALWAYS ABOUNDING and will begin the first Sunday in March and continue through the last Sunday of that month. You are encouraged to participate.

If you have not yet completed your questionnaire on Who's Who Among Free Will Baptists, this is your last opportunity to do so.

Since our last letter to you we have released some new book and booklet titles. 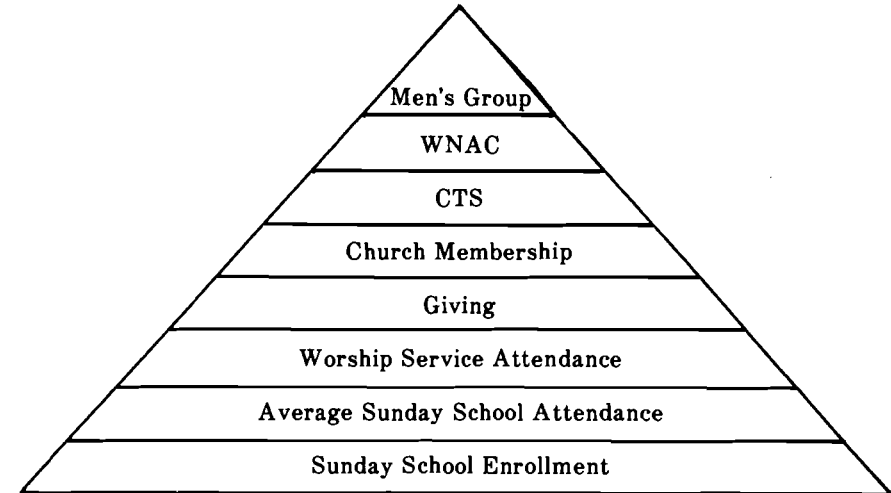

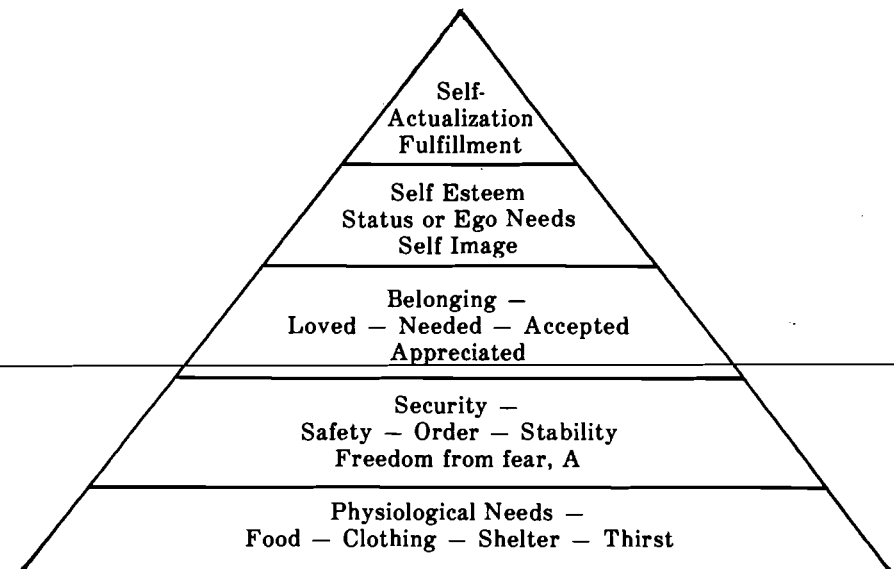

REPORT OF
THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE
SOUTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION
ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS
February 16-17, 1978

At the 1973 Convention the State Association approved the following three-year program which was designed to develop into a full-time Promotional Secretary and a walk-in State Book Store.

1. **FIRST YEAR** — The Promotional Secretary will visit each Conference twice. Start a traveling Book Store. Promote a three-year plan to make the office a full-time ministry. Have a newspaper every other month (as it is being done now). Salary \$500.00 plus mileage.

2. **SECOND YEAR** — Visit each Conference three times. Continue the Book Store (increase if possible). Continue to promote towards a full-time ministry. Continue the newspaper (same as first year). Salary \$800.00 plus mileage.

3. **THIRD YEAR** — Full-time State Promotional Secretary with walk-in Christian Book Store. Newspaper every month. Visit local churches and District Meetings.

NOTE: Full-time salary, duties, location of book store, and clerical help will be recommended to the State Association for their approval in the future by the Executive Committee BEFORE the full-time Promotional Secretary is hired.

Since this program did not work out to be successful, we the Executive Committee submit the following recommendations for the 1978-79 year only.

1. That the 1973 recommended program as stated above be completely discarded.

2. That our churches be strongly encouraged to support the Promotional Secretary's office on a consistent monthly basis. If the church gives a one-time annual gift, let them so state it so that the Promotional Secretary can appropriate it to determine his monthly office income.

3. That the Promotional Secretary be charged with the following specific responsibilities for the 1978-79 year only. He may involve himself with other state activities if time and funds permit.

Publish "The Informer" bimonthly. (Provided funds are available)

Promote the representation of our churches (with annual fee and delegates) to the 1979 State meeting. Also to promote the attendance of our people in general.

Promote the support (financial and news) for the Promotional office.

4. That the Promotional Secretary be paid up to \$300.00 out of the State Treasury if there is not sufficient funds in the Promotional Office Treasury to pay the secretary. This is a safeguard to assure the Secretary he will be paid for his services. If his office receives adequate funds, he will be paid entirely from his funds at the direction of the Executive Committee.

5. That the Executive Committee of the S. C. State Association be charged with the following specific responsibilities for the 1978-79 period:

a. meet with the Executive Committees of the four Conferences in the State and discuss reasonable and workable methods of further development and improvement of our present state ministries and for our entering into new works. The committee is requested to take into consideration the digest report of the information received by the Moderator's request for information survey

which was presented at the 1978 annual convention.

b. Supply a written report of recommendations to the 1979 State Convention. This report of recommendations is to be mailed to the pastors and churches of our state at least 30 days prior to the State meeting. This is to give our people ample time for prayerful consideration for their action in regard to the report.

APPENDIX VII
FWB YOUTH RALLY

Youth rallies have been a tradition in our area for many years. However, they have never seemed to continue with any enthusiasm. It was decided to promote a November rally with the film NOAH'S ARK. It was a success with over 200 in attendance at the Pamplico church. The newsletter form of advertisement was proposed, tried, and was successful. A mailing list of 200 names is established. Robert Bair, of Florence, was consulted in relation to rallies, and has since taken the responsibility of treasurer over the FWB Fund. Allen Gibson has been mainly responsible for promoting through the newsletter, and Garry Acree has spent time in personal promotion. A December rally was not as successful as hoped, but an offering was given that went to the Children's Home in Turbeville. A Sweetheart Banquet in February was a tremendous success, and has given indication that the time is right for youth rallies to flourish into a tremendous opportunity to reach area teenagers. In as much as we believe this effort is in the Will of God, what we need is the support of pastors and youth workers in our area, supporting and promoting the rallies in spirit and attendance. We are earnestly praying that young people in our area will see the need to seek God's Will in their lives, and through youth rallies, we hope this can be accomplished.

FWB YOUTH RALLY

FWB YOUTH RALLY is a name that represents an effort to promote regional youth rallies in the eastern area of South Carolina. The two extensions of FWB YOUTH RALLY are the FWB YOUTH NEWS and the FWB YOUTH FUND.

The FWB YOUTH NEWS is a monthly newsletter that is sent to young people and pastors informing them of youth related events, and particularly the announcement of monthly rallies. The newsletter is available to anyone who requests it.

The FWB YOUTH FUND is a fund established through which operating expenses of the newsletter and the primary expenses of a rally could be paid, so an accurate accounting could be maintained.

The PURPOSE of FWB YOUTH RALLY is to provide a regular series of youth meetings in our area, and promote the participation of local churches, to develop a positive, spiritual attitude among FWB young people.

- Some of the goals of FWB YOUTH RALLY are:
1. To give young people from different FWB churches the opportunity of Christian fellowship.
 2. To sponsor speakers, films, banquets, and events of a specific nature that no one youth group could afford, but through a combined effort, many could benefit.
 3. To promote FWB organizations such as Bible College, summer camp, Bible Conference, etc.
 4. To plan a variety of quality activities that promote the spiritual and social development of FWB young people.
 5. As a combined effort, encourage and support local church youth activities.
 6. To be a help to local church activities.

APPENDIX X

SEVEN SIMPLE STEPS TO SOUL-WINNING SUCCESS IN THE LOCAL CHURCH

INTRODUCTION:

In 23 years of ministering the Lord has graciously blessed this preacher with a small measure of success in developing personal soul-winners within the congregation pastored. The following "seven steps" are by no means the only steps to developing a soul-winning church.

I. FIRST, BE THOROUGHLY CONVINCED YOURSELF THAT PERSONAL SOUL-WINNING IS GOD'S PROGRAM FOR THE LOCAL CHURCH

- A. Witnessing by mouth is a must. (Matt. 10:32,33; Romans 10:9,10)
- B. Note the early church's understanding of the Great Commission (Matt. 28:18-20; Mark 16:15; Luke 24:46; John 20:21; Acts 1:8)
- C. Begin with the pastor. A program is no good without a pusher. Someone must get the "ball-a-rollin'".
- D. Ask God to revive you (the pastor) spiritually. Ask God for a vision for lost souls. Spend a great deal of time in prayer.
- E. Start reading books about great soul winners. Men like David Brainard, D. L. Moody, John Wesley, R. A. Torrey, Uncle John Vassar and L. R. Scarborough will set your heart aflame for souls.
- F. Learn a Biblical plan of salvation. Mark the plan in your Bible.
- G. Write down a goal that you desire to reach in the area of soul-winning.

Pray about that goal, then commit yourself publicly to reach that goal for God. A certificate designed to write your goal on is included in this lesson. It may be cut out and framed for daily motivation.

H. There are 3 methods of witnessing in Acts.

1. Sermon Plan (8:29-35)
2. Story Method (10:1-34)
3. Spot Commercial (16:25)

II. SECOND, PUT THIS TO PRACTICE YOURSELF.

- A. Discipline yourself to "go". Great soul-winners like Gordon Sebastian, Roy Thomas, Paul Thompson advise this. (Use "Ten Most Wanted Men")
- B. Set aside a definite time each week to go soul-winning. In the beginning of this program it is best to go alone until you have mastered the plan and become recognized as an effective soul-winner.
- C. Find a partner after you have mastered the soul-winning plan. Select someone who shows promise and a desire to win others to Christ.
- D. Train your partner by taking him with you every week. Let him watch and ask questions. After approximately four weeks, begin to allow your partner to help you with the plan until he seems ready to present the plan without your assistance.
- E. Allow your partner to present the plan of salvation a couple of times while you observe. Afterwards encourage the new soul winner and help him in the weak areas of his presentation.
- F. Both you and your trained partner prayerfully select a new partner and begin this glorious process again.
- G. Give your best prospects to your newest soul-winners. Winning someone to Christ will bolster their faith and encourage their hearts.
- H. Have prayer together before you go soul-winning. Pray for the individual who will be presenting the plan of salvation for the first time. Get your heart aflame before you try to win someone else to the Lord.
- I. Have a time of sharing good testimonies before the group goes soul-winning. This will also be a time of challenge and encouragement.
- J. After presenting the plan of salvation, analyze what happened. Learn from mistakes and rejoice in the fruit.

III. THIRD, DESIGN THE SUNDAY MORNING SERVICES TO BE EVANGELISTIC.

- A. Acknowledge and advertise them to be so.
- B. Plan the program and music to be conducive to sinners walking the aisle to be saved.
- C. Preach the kind of sermons and extend the type of invitations that get the lost to Jesus.

IV. FOURTH, TRAIN COUNSELORS FOR ALTAR WORK.

- A. This is an excellent way to get members started in soul-winning.
- B. Use the National Home Missions' paper on "Working at the Altar".
- C. Constantly review this paper with your counselors — definitely before each revival.
- D. Use the National Home Missions materials.

V. FIFTH, PREACH SERMONS ON SOUL-WINNING WITH INVITATIONS FOR COMMITMENTS TO WITNESS.

- A. Give invitations to get them started giving each a tract.
- B. Give invitations to promise to attend visitation.
- C. Give invitations to fill out "soul-winning pledge cards".

VI. SIXTH, CONDUCT SPECIAL STUDIES AND HAVE SPECIAL EMPHASIS ON SOUL-WINNING

- A. Have a clinic on soul-winning teaching and demonstrating the winning of the lost to Christ. Jack Hyles' book and demonstration record "Let's go Soul-Winning" and Bob Shockey's book "Let's Go Fishing".
- B. Have a "Home Missions' Rally" conducted by Rev. Bob Shockey or Roy Thomas.
- C. Have a "child-evangelism study" conducted by a C.E.F. missionary.

VII. SEVENTH, CONSTANTLY BE LOOKING FOR MEANS AND METHODS OF GETTING YOUR MEMBERS IN DIRECT CONFRONTATION WITH THE UNSAVED FOR THE PURPOSE OF WITNESSING.

- A. What about extension services? (street meetings, jail services, etc.)
- B. What about blanketing the community? (religious survey, tract blitz, etc.)
- C. What about special outings? (basketball marathon, scare mare, rollerama)

General Fund Report TO THE BRETHREN OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION From Free Will Baptist Bible College

Dear South Carolina Friends:

Thank you for your prayer support and financial gifts to Free Will Baptist Bible College during the past year. The beginning enrollment this year of 562 students was two above the largest beginning enrollment in the history of the school. Today, recently-trained teachers are teaching successfully both in the public schools of Tennessee and a number of private Christian day schools. In the past two years, 18 students have been graduated with certification.

In May, 1977, 92 students finished their training at Free Will Baptist Bible College. There were 56,345 tracts distributed during the year by students in practical work groups. These students dealt with 13,669 persons; of whom 1,267 were saved; and 1,777 made other decisions. Free Will Baptist Bible College still emphasizes soul winning — perhaps now more than ever before.

The "Stack the Racks" program sponsored by the National Youth of C.T.S. has amounted to \$8,669.94. This will purchase approximately 860 volumes, bringing the library volumes to a total of 27,620. Our library is comfortably housed and affords a quiet place for study and research for the students. During this year, we have added 80 books to the Historical Collection; 176 books to the Curriculum Laboratory; and 1,461 books to the regular library.

We are happy to remind you that Dr. Malcolm Fry left the "Stack the Racks" project open and asked our C.T.S. groups to continue to provide books for the library this year, too. This is a must in light of the added volumes needed for graduate school approval.

APPENDIX XXXI

RULES THAT GOVERN THE POSTON-BAGGETTE MEMORIAL LOAN FUND OF ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTIST STATE ASSOCIATION OF SOUTH CAROLINA

1. The applicant must be a member in good standing in a Free Will Baptist Church within our State Association.
2. The applicant must be recommended by his local church for a loan, with a statement that he or she has been unable to secure assistance from any other source.
3. The assistance is available to any qualified person entering or attending our Free Will Baptist College for any phase of full-time Christian service with Ministerial Students preferable.
4. (a) The loan will be secured by a promissory note signed by the applicant and co-signed by his or her church to guarantee the collection of said note.
(b) The loan may be issued for a period of six years maximum, and at the option of the board may be extended for a period of one year. If the applicant fails to comply with the rules and regulations, the note will become due within one year from the time of default.
(c) No interest shall be charged on a loan as long as the applicant is a student; but thereafter at the rate of 4% annually until the loan is paid in full.
(d) A payment on this loan shall be expected within sixty days after ~~withdrawal or completion from school, and equal monthly payments~~ thereafter until the loan is paid in full.
5. All loans that are approved shall be paid directly to the Free Will Baptist Bible College.
6. The applicant must fill out the questionnaire provided by the Board.
7. Less than a "C" average will render the applicant ineligible for further assistance.
8. These rules can be revised or amended by the South Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists only.
