MEETING WITH THE EASTERN CONFERENCE
At Hillside Free Will Baptist Church
February 13-14, 1986

The service opened by singing "At Calvary." The song leader was Bro. Danny Stone, and the pianist was Miss Jean Stone. These served during the entire session, unless stated otherwise. Rev. Roy Thomas led in prayer.

Rev. Tim Hackett from the Beaver Creek Association brought the devotion. He read from Ezekiel 22:30, and talked about being a man with a vision, and knowing where he is going.

The Moderator then called the meeting to order. The Host Pastor, Rev. Jimmy Miller gave us a warm welcome. The Assistant Moderator, Rev. Talmadge Brown gave the response.

The delegates were then seated. The program then was approved. The Committee on Committees was appointed. They were Rev. Ronnie Jones, as chairman, Rev. William Porter, Rev. William Jacobs, Rev. Gene Adams, Rev. Lloyd Gore, and Rev. Jimmy Miller.

The visitors were then recognized and made welcome. The Moderator led us in prayer, and then brought his message. (Appendix I.) We then recessed.

THURSDAY MORNING WORSHIP

We opened by singing "Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus." Rev. Wilburn Beasley led in prayer. The special music was presented by Gwen Jones from the Hillside Church. Rev. Johnnie Bullman from the Palmetto Conference brought the morning message. He read from Matthew 9:35-38, pointing out that we need to have the concern that Jesus had. MSC to seat the Bible Belt Conference. We then had dinner.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

We opened by singing "Joy Unspeakable." Rev. Sherwood Lee led in prayer. Rev. John Suttles from the Eastern Conference brought the devotion. He read from Acts 11:4-7, and talked about the testimony that Peter had.

The Credentials Committee gave a partial report. (Appendix II.) MSC to accept. The Committee on Committees then gave their report. (Appendix III.) MSC to accept.

We then sang "The Lily of The Valley." Rev. Melvin Worthington, our National Executive Secretary gave a seminar on Target 90. The State Executive Committee report was given. (Appendix IV.) MSC accept the written report, and the oral report given by the moderator. We then recessed.

THURSDAY NIGHT WORSHIP

We opened by singing "He Keeps Me Singing." Rev. Robert Rose led in prayer. Rev. Talmadge Brown led in the time of testimonies. The special music was presented by the Stone Trio from the Hillside Church. Rev. Ronald Creech from Free Will Baptist Bible College brought the evening message. He read from 2 Samuel 23:8-23, and talked about the Mighty Men of David. MSC for Rev. Bobby Carden to replace Rev. Billy Jackson on the Nominating Committee.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

The service opened by singing "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder." Rev. Ron Moore led in prayer. Rev. Roger Johnson from the Central Association brought the devotion. He read from Luke 23:5, pointing out that Jesus stirred people, to get them doing the things they should.

The State Home Missions report then was given. (Appendix V.) MSC to accept. The report of the Promotional Office was given. (Appendix VI.) MSC to accept. The Promotional Office had borrowed \$469.00 from the State Treasurer. MSC to let this money be given to the Promotional Office, instead of it being a loan.

A motion was made for the Study Committee to study the procedures involved in the State Treasure paying for the printing of the Informer. MS to amend this by letting the State Executive Committee do this. MSC to accept as amended. The Executive Committee is to report next year about this.

FRIDAY MORNING WORSHIP

We opened by singing "Victory In Jesus." Rev. Randy Sawyer led in prayer. The special music was presented by Bro. Danny Stone, from the Hillside Church. Rev. David Carter from the Beaver Creek Association brought the message. He read from 2 Chronicles 7:14 pointing out the importance of Prayer. He used Jesus as an example.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

We opened by singing "Won't It Be Wonderful There?" Rev. Willie Justice led in prayer. Rev. Eddie Riddick from the South Carolina Conference brought the devotion. He read from Proverbs 14:5,25, pointing out that we need to be A True Witness.

The Ministers Retirement report was given. (Appendix VII.) MSC to accept. The Poston Baggett Loan Fund report then was given. (Appendix VIII.) MSC to accept. The CTS report then was given. (Appendix IX.) MSC to accept. The Youth Camp report was then given. (Appendix X.) MSC to accept.

The Children's Home report then was given. (Appendix XI.) MSC to accept. MS to accept their Constitution and By Laws. MS to amend this by changing the last sentence, in the Preamble. The change is to read, **Any change offered shall be in compliance with the State Association Constitution and By Laws.** MSC as amended. We stood for a break.

MSC for the State Executive Committee to approve the By Laws and Constitution of the Home Missions Board. The Treasurers report was given. (Appendix XII.) MSC to accept. The Credentials Committee Full report was then given. (Appendix XIII.) MSC to accept. The Woman's Auxiliary report was given. (Appendix XIV.) MSC to accept.

The Resolutions Committee report was given. (Appendix XV.) MSC to accept. The Public Morals Committee report was given. (Appendix XVI.) MSC to accept. We then stood and gave a rising vote of Thanks to the Host Church and Host Conference for hosting a fine Association. The Nominating Committee report was given. (Appendix XVII.) MSC to accept.

MSC to adopt Target 90 as a State Project. Rev. Norwood Gibson, our Promotional Director is to be our State Coordinator. Rev. Roy Thomas spoke a few minutes on behalf of our National Home Missions Department. Rev. Randy Sawyer spoke a few minutes on behalf of South Eastern Free Will Baptist College.

MSC to send Our Promotional Director to Washington, D. C., to represent our State Association, at the American Association of Christian Schools. Rev. Jimmy Aldridge spoke a few minutes about the Advance Program on behalf of our National Foreign Missions Department. MSC to give our Promotional Director \$300.00 as a late Christmas offering for 1985. MSC to give a rising vote of Thanks to the Program Committee for preparing a fine program.

MSC that the State Moderator be recommended to the National Nominating Committee for their consideration of placing him on the National Executive Committee. MSC to give the State Clerk \$100.00 per year instead of \$50.00. Rev. Joe Cagle dismissed in prayer.

APPENDIX IV

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

1. We met at Fellowship FWB Church, June 17, 1985 for the purpose of getting the 1986 State Association Program.
We also agreed at this meeting to meet with the Board Directors, or Chairman, the day before the State meeting to go over all reports being presented to the State.
2. We met at Fellowship FWB Church, November 5, 1985. At this meeting, several items of business were discussed.
 - A. We agreed for Bro. Norwood Gibson to check with the Bible Belt Conference about the number of churches that were in that Conference, and to see if it still existed as a Conference.
 - B. We agreed for the clerk to write the Childrens Home Board Chairman, reminding him to have the Constitution and By Laws ready to present to the State Association. They had a one year extension, from the 1985 State Association.
 - C. We agreed for the clerk to write the State Home Mission Board Director, reminding him to include in their Constitution and By Laws, the purpose for their board, the rules that govern its functions.
 - D. We agreed for the Moderator to call the local conference moderators, and send a letter to the Pastors, encouraging their churches to bring a Love Offering to the Thursday Night Service, and give to the Promotional Office.
 - E. We agreed to recommend that the Promotional Office borrow \$469.00 from the State Treasurer to pay the printing of the Oct.-Nov. issue of the Informer.
 - F. We agreed to recommend the 1986 Pop Willey Missions Offering to go as follows:
 - 45% to National Foreign Missions
 - 5% to National Foreign Missions General Fund
 - 10% to National Home Missions
 - 30% to State Home Missions
 - 10% to Local Conference Missions
3. We agreed to recommend that the State Association approve the establishment of a Study Committee of five men to determine the needs of our senior people, to include an adequate retirement plan, and how we can best meet these needs. Also to study how we can best improve our current ministries. The committee is to be appointed by the State Executive Committee. A report

is to be given to the State Association no later than the 1988 State Association meeting.

APPENDIX V

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

Dear Brethren:

~~The newly elected Free Will Baptist State Mission Board met in March to examine~~ a prospective candidate for Mission work in South Carolina. This involved investigating Aiken and Orangeburg, South Carolina as potential cities to start new Mission work in as soon as possible.

The Director and part of the Mission Board met in those cities with the Missionary and obtained as much material and knowledge as possible to know God's Will in going to one particular city.

After much thought and examination of the Missionary, the Board was favorable to him coming to start a new Mission; however, after much prayer, the Missionary felt God leading to another new work in Kentucky.

The Mission Board met again in May to discuss the beginning of a new Constitution and by-laws for the new State Board of Missions. This is in compliance with our State Association directive for all Boards to present such to the State for their approval. A general outline was established and some discussion was made in this regard but was found later to be insufficient for the aims and purpose by the State's Executive Board.

The Board met again in December for further study of the Constitution and by-laws and to come up to date with our efforts to find a Missionary for our State work.

We have talked with many individuals in our State and elsewhere about this important work, but no one has been selected to serve in our Home Mission field at the present time.

We do trust that we will, as a State Association, join all other Free Will Baptist in the "Project 90" goals and let us see at least ten NEW works begin in our great state of South Carolina by 1990. Brethren, we can if we will work on in our Conferences and State Mission efforts. Conferences, PLEASE keep your's going and pray. Help us take the other half of South Carolina for our dear Lord. Pastors and godly laymen, pray about your going to new cities and communities to begin new churches whether you receive money or not. We will have to do some sacrificing and, if we do, Jesus will bless in our State work. Let every ordained Free Will Baptist minister pray about going over to the next town, city, or community to begin a Mission for our Lord Jesus and Free Will Baptist.

Brethren, we have the truth as a denomination. Let's go out and unashamedly proclaim Christ.

Beloved, there are many churches not giving to missions at this time. Will you Pastors pray and give your churches an opportunity to support this State work? Our State Board will never be in competition with our Conferences in this work for our mandate is to start churches where NO Conference has work. Amen!

The Free Will Baptist State Home Mission Board asks for an extension of time before we present the new Constitution and by-laws to the State Association or the State Executive Board for approval.

APPENDIX XI

CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

We, at the Children's Home, wish each and every church in the state will have a very good year in 1986, spiritually and financially.

We had a big year in 1985, operating at full capacity at times, ranging from 41

children in May to 21 in December, with an average of 31 children per day for the year.

We appreciate the help you have during the year of 1985 with your prayers and financial support. With a large number of children on hand, the expenses were high, however expenses were slightly less than 1984, as well as income being, slightly less, although the actual offering to the home was about \$17,000 above the previous year, but we transferred about \$17,000 less from our savings account than the year before. Details given at end of report in financial section. Since we did have to transfer funds from savings into the general fund to operate last year, this means we still need the support you have been giving and we trust you will continue to give to and pray for the home.

In 1984 we started being concerned about Bill H 2290, and continued to fight and lobby against the bill into 1985, a bill being drawn up by the 3-M committee to be given to the House of Rep. for passage, but the bill was tabled by a 10-5 vote by the committee, which means it will come off the table in 1986 and again we will be dealing with this bill, which if passed will effect the home.

As the number of children have declined, we have discussed more and more about dual ministries, mainly about operating a Christian school on premises, but since for 3 years in a row we had to transfer monies from the savings, we have gone slow on this as expenses are about \$1600 per month above income, as the need for transferring savings shows.

The number of children in all the F. W. Baptist Childrens home are down and it appears that some of the new child support laws are effecting this, although we have had several inquires about putting children into the home, but generally they were above the age policy for the home and we did not take all that tried to get in.

The home presently employs 3 full time employees and one part time employee. We had seven children saved with most of them being baptized. The children, who were old enough, sung in the Youth Choir at the Horse Branch FWB Church, with one child from the home attending the Free Will Baptist College. We had more sickness last year than we had experienced, with the smallest child being in the hospital two times.

All the children, who were eligible to attend, attended the S. C. Youth Camp, this being 13 children from ages 8 to 16 years old.

PART TWO: The home owns 83 acres, about half in woods, with all but 11 acres rented out to a farmer, however due to farmers losing money this past year, it may be hard to rent the land out in 1986. The buildings and yard for the home occupies 11 acres. Value of the home's property is as follows:

No new equipment or appliances were obtained during the year, but almost all air conditioning units, except a new one installed in 1984, were worked on, and we have decided that we will not spend any more money on two of the units. A lot of painting was done as well as putting in several new doors and several window replacements were made. Some furniture was purchased for boys dormitory and one outside swing and slide playset.

The buildings and equipment are generally in good shape, with the ice machine needing repairs and some fence work done. Some of the rooms in the dormitory were painted, but we hope to do some more inside painting this coming year.

PART THREE: For the second year in a row we have worked and revised the Constitution and By-Laws and we recommended these be adopted. The move made at the State Association early in 1985 concerning election of members have been incorporated into the Constitution and some wording in the Constitution and Preamble has been changed.
