# 1991 MINUTES SOUTH CAROLINA STATE ASSOCIATION FEBRUARY 7-8, 1991

#### THURSDAY MORNING-FEBRUARY 7

The Thursday morning meeting began with the hymn "When We All Get To Heaven" and prayer by Bun Hanna. The moderator brought the opening message (Appendix I).

Rev. Jimmy Bell, the host pastor, gave the welcome and Rev. Joe Cagle, the Assistant Moderator, gave the response. The delegates were seated and the program approved. The appointments for the Committee on Committees were made as follows, Rev. James Wilhide (Chairman), Rev. Terry Dennis, Rev. William Jacobs,

Rev. Mike McAuley and Rev. Johnnie Bullman. All visitors were welcomed including the National and Regional Representatives. <Recess>

The morning worship service commenced with the congregation singing "He Keeps Me Singing", prayer by Sigbee Dilda and special music by a trio from Beaver Creek Association. Rev. Billy Jones (Central Association) brought the morning message from I Samuel 10:1-7.

  inserting "near a town" instead of "in
   a town".
  - 4) MSC to amend section A of item 4

changing the word "approved to "recommend"

- 5) MSC to accept item 4 as amended
- 6) MSC to accept item 5

After these decisions, Item 10 was discussed. The morning service began with "Victory In Jesus". One report was given:

11. Woman's Auxiliary MSC (Appendix XII) A trio from Beaver Creek Association presented special music. Rev. Kenneth Cash (Beaver Creek Association) brought the message from Romans 12:1-7. Rev. Wilburn Beasley dismissed in prayer.

#### FRIDAY AFTERNOON-FEBRUARY 8

The afternoon session opened with "To God Be The Glory" and Rev. James Raper led in prayer. Rev. Lamar Smith (South Carolina Conference) brought the devotion from Acts 17:16. Then the following reports were presented:

Item X from the Executive Committee Report (Purchase of the Promotional Office Property) was further discussed. The following decisions were made:

- 1) MSC to amend the proposed price by presenting an offer between \$85,000 and \$97,000.
- 2) MSC to purchase Promotional Office property.
- 3) MSC for Executive Committee and Promotional Office Director to suggest fund raising methods.
- 4) MSC to not use any of the Pop Willey Offering for the purchase of property.
- A.C. Allen (from Children's Home Board) made a motion to sell 51.9 acres of the Children's Home property to the town of

Turbeville to be used as a spray waste sight. The price would be \$1,000 per acre. A substitute motion was given (MSC) that included the following:

1) Further study to be made by the Children's

Home concerning the

opposition and dangers involved.

- 2) The Children's Home Board is to contact the State Executive Committee, who in turn would contact the General Board to transact this item of business.
- 3) The findings of the Children's Home
  Board be sent to the
  Conferences/Associations' moderators so they
  could meet with their Executive
  Committees to get their feelings about this
  matter.

#### APPENDIX IV

The state Executive Committee and General Board met June 5, 1989. The following items were discussed:

1. We agreed for Rev. Lamar Smith, Rev. Joe Cagle and Rev. Norwood Gibson to study the number of

churches that would be needed to form a new conference/Association for membership into the State Association. They are to report to the Executive Committee. Rev. Joe Cagle to serve as Chairman.

2. We agreed for the same committee to check into the possibility of the

State Association being hosted by conferences/associations that would have motel and restaurant facilities available. If a conference/association didn't have these facilities then that conference/Association could work something out with another conference/association. There would need to be proper seating and parking space at the host church as well.

- 3. We agreed to send the Digest of Reports separate from the Informer this time, due to the State being moved up, and the reports would not be ready to send at that time.
  - 4. We also selected speakers for this State Association.

The State Executive Committee also met December 17, 1990. From the two meetings, we recommend the following.

- 1. We recommend that each local church be allowed to represent to the State Association with two delegates.
- 2. We recommend that the board mileage, and committee members allowance be changed from the present amount of 20 cents per mile, to the IRS approved mileage.
- 3. We recommend for a conference/association to be considered for State Association membership, it must consist of 3 or more churches, not to include missions.

  Since most our conference/association churches may not have a sanctuary large enough to host the State Association, near a town with adequate facilities for lodging, or maybe the sanctuary is large enough, but located too fare from a hotel for attendants to drive back and forth; therefore we recommend the following:
- 4. We recommend that the State Association meet each year on the

appointed dates at a place (church) recommended by the Executive Committee, then

approved by the State Association.

- 1) That this meeting place be in a church large enough to host the meeting.
- 2) That the meeting place (church) be near a town with adequate motel and restaurant facilities.
  - 3) That the attendants of the meeting be

responsible for their own lodging and dining Expenses during the State Association, without the host church preparing any meals.

If a conference/association does not have a church near a town with adequate facilities, then,

5. We recommend that the host conference/association work out the necessary arrangements with a sister conference/association, for the use of a church to host the meeting.

And that the host conference/association pay whatever expense necessary to the host church, it has arranged with, to hold the meeting.

The Executive Committee and General Board met the day before the state (Feb.6) and recommended the following:

- 6. We recommend that the State Treasurer pay the 1989 retirement for the Promotional Director, that he hasn't received, in the amount of \$545.00.
- 7. We recommend that the Promotional Director's raise from last year, be divided, with half going for housing and half going as salary.

- 8. We recommend that the State Association invite the National Association to meet in our state of South Carolina. This would be about 12 years ahead or in the year 2004.
- 9. We recommend that in the Executive
  Committee Report, that the phrase "and
  committee members", be added to item 2, and
  in item 4 that the word "approved" be
  changed to the word "recommend" and
  the word "approved", go just before the
  words "by the State Association".
- 10. We recommend that the State Association purchase the property of the State Promotional Office.

### APPENDIX VI RETIREMENT HOME REPORT

To:South Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptist

Meeting with the Eastern Conference at Mill Branch FWB Church, Johnsonville, SC FEBRUARY 7-8, 1991

At the 1990 state meeting the Retirement Home Committee stated that a report would be given at the 1991 meeting in the following three areas:

- 1. Buildings: Types, construction, cost, etc.
- 2. Resident Cost: For rent and services rendered.
- 3. Location: Available medical service and other needed services for retired people. The committee has not done this study. It is not the fault of the committee members, but due to the chairman not having the time to provide them with a detailed list for their area study. However, the chairman did do some research in these area's and he gives the following report:
- 1. From information gained from other retirement home it will not be possible for us to operate a self supporting ministry. The cost of buildings, needed services rendered for the residents, administrative cost and maintenance cost, to maintain a self supporting ministry, would require a residents fee that would be beyond the ability of our people to pay without some kind of subsidy.

I spent several hours with Mr. Hickman, the administrator of the Presbyterian Home in Florence, and he was able to give me some valuable information in this area. Their resident fee os \$930.00 per month. They do not receive any government subsidy, but they do receive subsidy through several sources from their denomination. Mr. Hickman state that if space is available they do not deny occupancy because the person can't pay the full fee nor do they turn a resident out if they become financially unable to pay. It

may be possible for us to provide less expensive housing and services than this home, but not to the point that our people could afford the fee without subsidy.

2. I Checked with the FHA in Florence and Columbia about government subsidy. They determine the persons adjusted income and require that they pay 30% of that for rent. The government pays the balance up to what they consider a fair rent value. There is a good possibility that our people could qualify for this subsidy but there are conditions involved that we probably would not want to

submit to. We would have to set the retirement ministry up as a separate, incorporated organization. At best we would be nothing more than a sponsor of the ministry. We could not limit occupancy to Free Will Baptist, race, religion or even retired people. It would include handicapped people also. The only alternative subsidy would be from our churches and I don't believe we are ready to take this on.

3. I also learned from Mr. Hickman that there has been a law passed in our state, to become effective in 1992, that would require all retirement facilities to be licensed by the state. As I understand it the law would not affect religious teachings in the institution but it would require that the administration and staff meet certain educational criteria. It would also make certain requirements on building facilities and services offered. At this point I have not had the opportunity to acquire a copy of the law, but I do plan to do so, hopefully by this state meeting time.

With the above information in mind we recommend that the Retirement Committee remain active for at least one more year and continue further research into this ministry.

# APPENDIX IX YOUTH CAMP REPORT

The weeks of June 18th through 29th, 1990, served us well as 139 Juniors, 51 Teens, and 60 workers and counselors from across the state gathered at Camp Forest near Cheraw. Although this was my first year as director along with shifting responsibilities among board members, the Lord blessed us with two successful weeks. Rev. MIke Trimble from North Carolina did a very good job as camp evangelist and fun time director. Rev. John Weaver, a summer intern from FWBBC, also did a fine job as chapel speaker. David Aycock, John Weaver, Reuben Cason, and Rick Cason did excellent teaching in the morning classes. Jeff Hart, Kristi Hanna, and Camille Scott did a good job conducting the singing. had 6 recorded salvation experiences, many rededications, and a few who committed themselves to full time Christian service.

We appreciated your prayers and your giving which doubled from last year. This helped immensely with the encountered increased expenses this year. However, counselors seemed to be much harder to enlist. Please prayerfully consider helping this year. Teen camp suffered drastic decline in participation as the Junior camp enrollment remained about the same.

On June 5, 1990, I shared the following information and intent with the SC State Executive Board. The committee received the information with unanimous approval.

On May 29, 1990, the Camp Board and director inspected the Woodmen of the World Youth Camp near Patrick, SC. After investigating the facilities, possibilities, and cost, we have unanimously agreed that the Woodmen Youth Camp would better meet our needs for the camp ministry and at the same time prove more appealing to our youth. The following information forms the basis for this decision.

Overall, the facilities are much more updated and convenient. The kitchen and dining hall are air conditioned and provide more cooking appliances as well as provide paper goods, plates, cups, etc. Ice Machines are provided and do not have to be rented.

Sleeping facilities are in the form of dormitories with 28-30 beds each. allow close to a maximum of 180 compared to the 120 at the present location. They are set up so as to provide more security and ease in keeping up with campers. This would also help in easing the demand for more counselors. A modern facility bath house is provided in the center of the three dorms located in the girls area and the three dorms in the boys area. They have clean tile floors, lavatories w/ mirrors, individual fiberglass shower stalls with a private dressing area at each entrance. Hot water is also available in each of these. There is a maintenance person on the grounds provided by the Woodmen's Camp at all times in case of any problems. The boys' and girls' areas are separated with a six foot wall that can be extended higher if necessary.

The chapel area where worship services and classes will be held is also air conditioned. In this same building there is an area for crafts. Staff quarters and first aid and nurses quarters are provided.

Recreation facilities and equipment are provided. These included softball field and equipment, football, soccer, badminton, horseshoes, tennis court, basketball court, volley ball court, ping pong, tetherball and archery. There is fishing and canoeing in the camp lake which is about five acres in size. A large swimming pool with certified lifeguards provides safer and cleaner swimming. The swimming pool will be blocked from outside viewing. Swimmers can be seen at all times by lifeguard and counselors.

All of the above plus electricity and water and insurance is included in the camp fee of

\$45.00 per week. Cost a present is \$30.00 per week. Because of the vast improved difference in facilities, we believe this fee would not be an obstacle for our people and would be well worth the increase.

Attendance has declined over the past years, especially with our teens. Many of the complaints received would help be resolved in relocating. The State Constitution or By-Laws do not address the issue of camp location. Therefore, there would be no change in the Constitution by relocating. The change would return youth camp dates to the first two weeks of August in 1991 because of unavailability in June. We hope that this move along

with changes already being made in our program will help reverse the present trend of declining participation.

The Camp Board has set up a display with pictures and information to familiarize you with the new situation. Please drop by some time during this meeting. A Camp Board member will be there to answer any questions. Teen Camp will be August 5-9 this year with Junior Camp the following week, August 12-16. The board has set the camper fee at \$45.00 per camper with the \$10.00 registration fee remaining the same.

Be it resolved that the State Association of Free Will Baptists, consisting of approximately 12,000 members, at it's annual session on February 8, 1991, do state our strong support of the Human Life Proctection Act.

Be it further resolved, that we strongly urge every member of the South Carolina legislature to support such an amendment.
